Education / Training (Bernard Jeune)

BJ reviewed the settlement of Student FTE for autumn 11/spring 12 and autumn 12/spring 13. Since 2008, Institute of Public Health (IPH) has had an increase in FTE revenues. Standard programmes such as medical studies have not changed. However, the number of hours taught on Public Health has increased by 20 % since it has been possible to take the bachelor programme in Odense. The staff at the Research Unit of Health Promotion teaches a greater number of hours than most of the staff on the IPH's other research units.

JBN: The research unit's is allocated accordingly resources to hire part time staff.

BJ: As the PhD School is also required to cut down expenses. It means that the number of PhD-course is reduced (except for generic and general courses).

BJ: Since 2005, the number of biostatistical guidance of PhD students has increased by 450 % simultaneously with the increase of number of PhD students. The number of staff has not been adjusted accordingly. In the coming years, the number of PhD students will be reduced from 143 to 90, and thus the need for guidance reduced accordingly. IPH and the faculty are now working on a useful solution. Employees from MaxO are expected to be able to assist in the acute situation.

BJ: The number of hours spent on guidance in connexion with examination and examinations in general is only recorded at the local research unit - not at institute level.

The Faculty management will continue the strategy work. One of the focus areas will be economy.

The SDU Grant Office recommends the scientific staff and research units to seek more international funding, i.e. EU funds. AA has good experience with applying for start-up grants. One of her colleague has just received DKK 150,000.

Esbjerg Campus has been working with a new profile. So far, IPH (Health Promotion) has not been involved in the process and it is dissatisfactory. On a recent meeting with UC, possibilities of cooperation were discussed; ant the UC was very excited about a future cooperation. The Dean is working on IPH taking part in the process

Status on the economy of the IPH

JBN: The economy of all the research units looks reasonable. As announced on the last meeting for Heads of Research Units the Institute's budget must be reduced by approx. 700,000 DKK. Redundancies will not be the solution, but the funding of positions must change from ordinary to external funding and postponing vacant posts.

The Faculty Administration has increased - due to the decentralization of tasks originally solved at the Central Administration. The Dean's Office will focus on a reduction in the administrative costs when savings are to be identified.
